Large Map

Goals:

The goal of this project is to have students recognize different landmarks and locations in the state of New York. It is also to practice labeling a map.

Supplies:

Scissors
Colored Pencils
Glue or Tape

Large Map instructions:

- 1) Print pages 1-4. Do NOT cut out the shape of New York. Tape together the four sheets using the numbers to guide you (1 matches next to 1, etc)
- 2) Print Pages 5 and 6. Have students color the pictures on page 5 if you would like. Cut out all the pictures and the city names.
- 3) Start with labeling the cities using the city answer key (page 10) or a map. The black dots are where cities are located.
- 4) If you have *older students*, you could give them a few minutes before reading clues, to see if they can place some of the landmarks without any clues.
- 5) Then, read the clues (page 9) to the students (or students can read themselves). Students can glue or tape the pictures to the map- or even draw them in! Have them place all images before gluing.
- 6) If you have internet access at the time of the project, you can visit our blog and pull up videos for some of the clues to give students a learning add-on.

The goal of this project is to have students recognize different landmarks and locations in the state of New York. It is also to practice labeling a map.






Small Map instructions:


- 1) Print pages 7 & 8.
- 2) Decide if you want students to write in the city names (older students), or cut and paste the words on page 8. If cutting and pasting, have students cut out the city names on page 8.
- 3) Start with labeling the cities using the city answer key (page 10) or a map.
- 4) Now for the pictures- have students color the pictures on page 8 if you would like. Cut out all the pictures.
- 4) If you have *older students give* them a few minutes before reading clues, to see if they can place the landmarks without any clues.
- 5) Then, read the clues (page 9) to the students (or students can read themselves). Students can glue or tape the pictures to the map- or even draw them in if you have older students. ***NOTE: It is a tight squeeze use the answer key to guide the students as to where to fit the pictures. It is OK if the picture is outside of the map area. They should place them all before gluing.
- 6) If you have internet access at the time of the project, you can visit our blog and pull up a video to give students a hint if they can't guess it, or just to watch as a learning add-on. The videos are numbered.





















Clues

- 1) Right on the border of Canada is a large, wet, and loud landmark. This landmark is on both United States soil and Canadian soil.
- 2) In Plattsburgh, you'll find the oldest known fossil reef in the world in this large body of water.
- 3) This popular food item, found all over the country, originated in Buffalo.
- 4) Kodak was originally establish in Rochester, a city famous for this artistic hobby.
- 5) Syracuse gets more of this than most cities during the winter time.
- 6) Albany is the capital of New York and is marked with a special symbol.
- 7) Despite its name, New Rochelle is one of the oldest cities in America. Its most famous citizen was Thomas Paine, who wrote "Common Sense" during the American Revolution. You can visit this building there, which is now a museum.
- 8) You'll find this nautical landmark in Montauk, which is surrounded on three sides by water.
- 9) In Ithaca, you'll find over 100 of these beautiful natural wonders within 10 miles of downtown.
- 10) This large building, the first to be built with 100 stories, can be found in Manhattan.







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
